


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Weekly update:

Chief Cadmus reminded all to follow the Truth and Reconciliations Call to Actions (TRC). In this, he spoke that in taking part in Professional Development speaks to call number 57. In addition, after the Territorial Acknowledgement, share in some form of action that you are taking to uphold the TRC's recommendations. With this, I want to share part of my leadership commitment to the calls to action, is to move up all items that attend to Indigenous education at staff meetings and the like begin all conversations. This intention and action, demonstrates my commitment to not let the journey of reconciliation to never take the back burner – it is to take the lead.



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Presentation:


