





Morning families,








Turning the tide:

Primary Literacy in a team effort at Wildflower school. This was a fun class game where each child received their own group of letters to cut up and then manipulate to spell the word from hearing it auditorily. After a student spelled it aloud it was then written on the board.


Principal pursuits:

The marking session at the School Board Office, despite being several people short due to illness and TTOC staffing shortages went very well.
